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Mayor Gutierrez recognized the following who spoke regarding:

• Ms. Diana Taylor, 5505 Columbia Drive - who spoke regarding she has had no follow-up regarding her drainage problems, speed bumps, asked what the city is going to do about the young man and police brutality, and what is the city going to do about Martinez. She stated that racism is in Schertz.

The following spoke regarding the Zakee Rayford incident, police accountability, police policies:

- Ms. Myra Dumapias no address given. Mayor Gutierrez asked Ms. Dumapias to state her name and address for the record, there was a conflict between Ms. Dumapias and the Mayor as to why her address needed to be given. Mayor Gutierrez indicated it was based on their rules of procedure. She provided it very quickly and the Mayor asked her to slow down due to not being able to capture what address she gave for the record. Further conflict arose between Ms. Dumapias as she wanted to see the exact law where she has to give her address. The Mayor stated that giving her address was part of the rules and procedures. Ms. Dumapias stated she didn't feel safe giving her address because what she is about to address has to do with police brutality. Mayor asked please if she would like to speak to provide the address. Ms. Dumapias indicated that she did not feel safe. As she did not repeat her address the Mayor asked if she would please take a seat. Conflict between Ms. Dumapias and the Mayor continued until the Mayor asked that the microphone be turned off. The Mayor asked Ms. Dumapias to take a seat. Ms. Dumapias turned toward the crowd and continued trying to tell those what facts she had in a very loud voice. The Mayor asked for the next person, Ms. Josey Garcia to come forward.
- Ms. Josey Garcia Mayor stated that Ms. Garcia did not list an address on the list and to please state her name and address. She stated as a community advocate she does not feel safe to put her physical home address, as that might put her life in jeopardy while they are begging for the lives of others. Ms. Garcia got very loud stating the community is crying and begging. Mayor stated that they want to hear from her and want her input, but that we do need her name and address.

Mayor stated "ladies and gentlemen we're trying to be respectful here, we are trying to get the meeting going as planned. The name and address are part of their rules of procedure, if you refuse to provide your name and address, then we are going to refuse to allow you to speak. Believe him, he wants to hear from you, Council wants to hear your input, but we do need your name and address." Ms. Garcia became very load, Mayor continued stating that he will not allow them to use our City Council as part of your platform." Ms. Garcia stated that there is no platform, Mayor stated that it certainly appears to be that - reference their platform. Mayor stated "that you can step up to the mic and provide your name and address, and we will be glad to hear from you/them."

• Ms. Jolene Garcia, (the guest of Marie Bond) - 1013 Keanna Place - Ms Garcia

made a plea to Mayor Gutierrez and Council to contact Mr. Kevin Rayford and Zekee Rayford. She pleaded with Council to make historical change with their policing. She stated she did have an agenda and a platform and it was their right to be a person of color in this country without fear of retribution of the skin we live in. "Be on the right side of history. We are ready to work with you to make change."

- Ms. Mandy Moore, 1653 N.Santa Clara Rd She spoke about, in her opinion, uncouth remarks that were made last Council Meeting showing bias in our community. She spoke about the abuse of power in the Zekee Rayford event and the obvious bias of some citizens with their actions as they walked through the crowd outside the council chamber. Ms. Moore gave her opinion on the actual arrest of Mr. Zekee Rayford. Ms. Moore's time was up and Mayor Gutierrez asker her to return to her seat. Her microphone was turned off, and she continued to talk and yell to Council. Ms. Moore did return to her seat after several requests from Mayor Gutierrez.
- Mr. Leonard Moore, 1653 N. Santa Clara Rd Mr. Moore started off by telling Council they all know what happened with the Zekee Rayford incident and are choosing to do nothing about it. Mr. Moore rehearsed the events of Zekee Rayfords arrest and expressed his disgust with the actual arrest and the Council's reaction. Mr. Moore asked Council to hold the police offers accountable for their actions.
- Ms. Valerie Reiffert, a guest at 5504 Columbia Dr. Ms. Reiffert reiterated some events of November 10, 2020, at the City Council meeting highlighting events that she disagreed with. Ms. Reiffert also acknowledged one of Schertz EMT workers asking Zekee's mother how Zekee was doing. She noted the difference of the EMT worker who showed he had a heart and really cares about the victim and the Police Department and who they are really protecting and serving. Ms. Reiffert gave additional closing remarks.
- Ms. Sandra Kearns, 416 Eagle Flight Ms. Kearns began her remarks by asking Council to place the issue of Police accountability on the agenda. Ms. Kearns addressed Mayor Gutierrez and asked him to release reports (files and records) of the police officers involved in the Zekee Rayford arrest. (While Ms. Kearns was speaking, another woman in the back of the room began to speak. Mayor Gutierrez asked her to please hold her comments and have more respect while Ms. Kearns is speaking.) Ms. Rayford stated Zekee's past was released, and he was slandered but Mayor Gutierrez would not release the Police officers records. (Mayor Gutierrez gave Ms. Kearns his e-mail address and offered to send the 20 videos available of the Zekee Rayford incident).
- Darius Lemelle,1013 Keanna Place Mr. Lemelle stated he is a black veteran who recently returned from Iraq. Mr. Lemelle stated before going to Iraq he was trained in the rules of engagement and proportionate force. He noted since many Police departments posses military style weapons and gear he would think it is common sense that the same rules of engagement apply when dealing with American citizens. Mr. Lemelle continued to point out the unnecessary force used by the Police officers and how he feels it was unmerited. Mr.

Lemelle stated he has seen a bias against the Rayford family and rehearsed the events of a March 16th warrant to search the families home and identifies questionable details about the raid. Mr. Lemelle states he believes the officers involved in the event on November 2, 2020, should be terminated and Office Martinez should be terminated and charged with perjury for the March 16, 2020, raid. Mr. Lemelle gave additional closing remarks. Applause erupted in the back of the chambers - Mayor Gutierrez asked the people to please hold their applause stating "this is not an awards banquet" Mayor Gutierrez states being disrespectful does not help your cause.

- Ms. Marie Bonds,1013 Keanna Place Ms. Bonds identifies herself as the sister of Zekee Rayford. Ms. Bonds gives statistics referencing unarmed black Americans killed by officers in the states. Ms. Bonds gave additional closing remarks. Ms. Bonds began to reading names from a list she had as she walked away from the podium. Mayor Gutierrez invited Mr. Brad Ward to come to the podium to speak while Ms. Bonds was still reading names with a loud voice. Mayor Gutierrez stated our rules and procedures are designed to maintain order. Conducting yourselves in this manner is, at times, shameful. The reading of names and talking continued as Mayor Gutierrez again invited Mr. Brad Ward to speak.
- Mr. Brad Ward, 12619 Maid Marian Mr. Ward addressed building codes and some compliance with them. He spoke about the difficulty of getting permits to build his home. He finally hired a builder to build his home and now that his home is built, he can't obtain a certificate of occupancy because of missing paperwork. He expressed his concern/views on the stringent requirements to build in Schertz. He posed the question if the inspections on his foundation are required to get his certificate of occupancy, how did the house make it to framing stage? Mr. Ward is asking for the city to consider waivers for some engineering requirements that are keeping him from obtaining his certificate of occupancy.
- Ms. Kapree Rayford,1013 Keanna Place She is concerned that the Zekee Rayford arrest is not being place on the agenda and that her brother had to move out of her fathers home. Ms. Rayford poses the question of why the Schertz Police Department won't hold their police officers accountable for their actions like they are holding Zekee Rayford accountable for his action? Ms. Rayford gave additional closing remarks.
- Mr. Jack Miller 1013 Keanna Place Mr. Miller addressed the police officer involved in child pornography and made several comments regarding the Schertz Police department. He also made mention of the footage he has on his camera that took place at our City Council meeting. Mr. Miller asked for additional time and Mayor Gutierrez responded, no. Mr. Miller unbuttoned his shirt and took his shirt off. The words "Don't tase me Bro" were written on his stomach and his back.
- Ms. Desiree Schanding, 5227 Roundtable Dr., San Antonio, TX.- Ms. Schanding spoke about Officer Martinez and the warrant he used to search the Rayford home. Ms. Schanding also recounted the event of November 2, 2020, that involved Zekee Rayford. Ms Schanding stated we allow police officers too

- much discretion in the line of duty. She also defines a felony charge in evading in a motor vehicle and states this charge should be dropped. Ms. Schanding asked that Police policies be placed on the Council's agenda.
- Mr. Ferrando Heyward, 2628 Hansel Heights Mr. Heyward states Schertz acts too conservative and slow on acting on information dispense. Mr Ferrando gave statistics with the city of Schertz on traffic violations. Mr. Hewyward shared if you feel unsafe with police, slow down, put on your hazard lights, and call 911. Mr. Heyward was stopped because his time was up.

There was talking from the back of the room - indiscernible.

Mayor Gutierrez opened it up for Council discussion and it was the concurrence of those present to leave the Ordinance as is with no changes. Ms. Dennis stated that she will bring back this ordinance only to reflect concurrence of the sitting Councilmembers and have each of them sign.

Mayor Gutierrez recognized Ms. Lesa Wood, Planning and Community Development Director who introduced Mr. Gil Durant, Chief Building Official. Ms. Wood and Mr. Durant provided a PowerPoint presentation regarding proposed updates to the Building regulations and why they are planning on adopting new or amended building codes. It was the concurrence of Council to move forward bringing back changes.

Mayor Gutierrez recognized Assistant City Manager Charles Klem who provided a PowerPoint regarding this item addressing several questions from Council. Councilmember provided their comments as well as Mr. Kahn the property owner.

Further discussion regarding the property owner not being compensated for the 291 feet, he was compensated for the 401 feet, which is the 297 feet and the engineering costs that are associated with it, and the construction costs. Councilmember Dahle stated again, the 291 feet is an additional expense, and yes if it was a new developer coming in per our UDC then absolutely they would be required to pay, but the property in question pre-dates everything out there except the convenience store. Councilmember Dahle stated that if Mr. Kahn did not get compensated from TxDOT for the 291 feet, if we are going to require it, then he believes that the City should take care of.

Councilmember Whittaker, had Mr. Kelm go over the disputes. One is the 291 feet and installation. Mr. Kahn came forward explaining what TxDOT purchased from him was for 401 feet and purchased 10 feet of land at an additional \$40,000. TxDOT did not cover the additional 291 feet. Mayor stated that he did get reimbursed for his property. Mr. Kahn is looking for compensation of the 25 foot easement.

Assistant City Manager Brian James came forward explaining what is required for a public line and the requirements for the property owner. He stated that Mr. Kahn is wanting to construct a sewer line, that triggers the need to extend across the property and provide an easement for it. Mr. Kahn came up once again explaining his issue.

Discussions continued on the two issues: 291 feet and compensation for the additional land. Mr. Kahn's expectations are to bring the Walgreens sewer to the boundary line and have the City pay for the additional feet at \$11:00 per square feet.

Mayor stated let's work on two resolutions, one for the 291 feet and another for the compensation of the additional land needed.

Mayor and Council continued discussion particularly with Mr. Kahn's issue and requested they form an add hoc group to discuss the issues. Mayor Gutierrez, Councilmembers Whittaker, Councilmember Scagliola, and Councilmember Dahle will serve on the add hoc committee.

BACKGROUND

In the EMS, Utility Billing, and Magazine functions, services are provided to customers up front and billing is settled later. Since services are provided before receiving payment, inevitably the City has customers that do not pay for the services provided.

When this occurs, staff reaches out to the customer to try to collect the outstanding payment including follow-up notices and phone calls to try to reach out to the customer to remind them of the outstanding balance and encourage payment. However, the longer the customer account goes without a payment the less likely that any payment will be received.

Once a customer account reaches 180 days without payment, Staff brings those accounts to the City Council to be "written off". This process is an accounting procedure following the Generally Accepted Accounted Principles (GAAP), which lays the framework of accounting practices in the U.S. This designation means it is unlikely those outstanding balances will ever be collected. This leads to an accounting adjustment on the City's Financial Statements to accurately show how much is still outstanding and is reasonable to expect collection.

If a customer's account has been written off, this does not erase or forgive that debt. The city can and does collect some portion of the amount owed by those customers. This can be through the debt collection agency used by EMS or if the customer returns to the City and requests new services through the Magazine or Utility Billing.

The resolution authorizes the debt for these areas that is more than 180 days outstanding as of November 1, 2020, to be written off. These write-offs come before council quarterly and last came before council on September 22, 2020.

GOAL

To approve write-offs of bad debt in accordance with the standards laid out by GAAP.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT

This will show the City's Financial Statements according to national standards and City policy.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approve Resolution No. 21-R-01 to write off receivables that are older than 180 days.

FISCAL IMPACT

This accounting adjustment will not affect the City's Budget or financial standing. The amount written off is estimated during the budget process and is accounted for in the revenue estimations and the bad debt expense accounts. The action taken tonight will reduce the amount shown as owed to the City by \$467,802.06 and set it equal to the amount seen as still reasonably collectible. The breakdown is as follows:

EMS - \$405,083.38 Utility Billing - \$62,718.68 Magazine - \$0.00

The EMS write off amount is down about 20% due to fewer calls during this time as these write offs would be for April through June of 2020 which were affected by COVID-19.

The amount being written off for Utility Billing is more than double the typical amount given that the City has not been doing shutoffs due to the economic impacts of the COVID Pandemic. Next council meeting, staff is proposing a workshop to review this practice.

WHEREAS, the City Council through its action taken on December 8, 2020 desires to reaffirm the existing City Council Code of Ethics to include the current sitting members.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCHERTZ, TEXAS:

- Section 1. That the City Council Code of Ethics be amended to include the current sitting members by having each agree to place their signatures on the adopted document.
- Section 2. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Ordinance for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the Council.
- Section 3. All ordinances and codes, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.
- Section 4. This Ordinance shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.
- Section 5. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the City hereby declares that this Ordinance would have been enacted without such invalid provision.
- Section 6. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Ordinance, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, as amended, Texas Government Code.
- Section 7. This Ordinance shall be effective upon the date of final adoption hereof and any publication required by law.

City Council Code of Ethics

Introduction

The City Council Code of Ethics (the "Codes") applies only to the members of the City Council: the Mayor, the Mayor Pro-Tem and the other City Council members. Furthermore, all provisions of the Codes apply equally to the Mayor, Mayor Pro-Tem and City Council members, who must follow the content of the Codes as well as the spirit.

It is the policy of the City Council that all of its members shall abide by federal and state law. It is also the policy of the City Council that all of its members shall abide by the provisions set forth in the City Charter and all City ordinances and policies, including the Codes.

Purpose

By adopting these Codes, Council members commit to:

- transparent and accountable governance;
- honest, fair, and respectful dealings with fellow Council members, City staff, and the wider community; and
- working together to deliver the best outcomes for the long-term interests of the City.

These standards, together with the ongoing requirement for Council members to abide by Council policies, as they change from time to time, will ensure that public trust and confidence in the City Council is enhanced.

Limitations

The Codes are intended to support, explain, or otherwise clarify the articles set forth in the City Charter or to exercise the specific right given to the City Council in the City Charter in Article III, Section 3.01 and Article IV, Section 4.08, to exercise its governmental powers. Nothing in the Codes is intended to contradict or supersede the City Charter or state law.

Procedure

- 1. Council Member and Board, Committee or Commission Member Interactions
 - a. City boards, committees and commissions are formed in order to provide independent recommendations to Council and, in the case of some commissions, to conduct hearings in order to make determinations, which may or may not be subject to appeal to the Council.

2. Council Members Serving as Council Liaisons

a. A Council liaison is a Council member who is specifically assigned to be the liaison between the City Council and a board, committee or commission. The



primary role of the liaison is that of facilitator of communications between the board, committee or commission and the Council. A Council member who is appointed to sit as a member of a board, committee or commission is not a liaison for purposes of this policy.

b. A Council liaison shall facilitate communications between the board, committee or commission and the Council. The liaison should not be an advocate for the board, committee or commission, give direction to a board, committee or commission or influence a decision of a board, committee or commission. The liaison may, however, assist and provide guidance to a board, committee or commission with their work plans or agendas.

c. A Council Liaison Acts as the:

- i. Spokesperson on behalf of the Council when so directed by the Council.
- ii. Contact person, if the board, committee or commission (or an individual board, committee or commission member) wants such a channel of communication.
- iii. Council representative present to identify procedural and structural issues relating to the effective functioning of the board, committee or commission for Council.

d. Council Liaison Participation Expectations:

- i. Attendance is discretionary with the Council member. Attendance as a liaison at a board, committee or commission meetings is not required.
- ii. Liaisons shall have no vote on the board, committee or commission.
- iii. Liaison attendance at board, committee or commission retreats is discouraged unless attendance is requested by the board, committee or commission.
- iv. Liaisons do not have a right to be in attendance at board, committee or commission closed sessions and shall abstain from attending such closed sessions unless invited to attend by the collective board, committee or commission.

Ethical Conduct Rules

1. Ethical Conduct Rules for all City Council Members

a. During City Council meetings, City Council members shall assist in preserving order and decorum and shall neither by conversation or otherwise delay or interrupt the proceedings nor refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer or the rules of the City Council.



- b. During City Council meetings, a City Council member desiring to speak shall address the chair and, upon recognition by the presiding officer, shall confine discussion to the question under debate, avoid discussion of personalities and indecorous language, and refrain from personal attacks and verbal abuse.
- c. During City Council meetings, a City Council member desiring to question the administrative staff shall address questions to the City Manager, who shall be entitled either to answer the question(s) or designate a member of City staff. Such designation may occur at any time, including prior to a City Council meeting. City Council members shall not berate nor admonish staff members.
- d. During City Council meetings, a City Council member, once recognized, shall not be interrupted while speaking unless called to order by the presiding officer, to raise a point of order, procedure, or privilege, or unless the speaker chooses to yield to questions from another member. If a City Council member is called to order while speaking, that member shall cease speaking immediately until the question of order is determined. If ruled to be in order, the member shall be permitted to proceed. If ruled to be not in order, the member shall remain silent or make additional remarks so as to comply with rules of the City Council.
- e. During City Council meetings, City Council members shall confine their questions to the particular matters before the assembly, and in debate, shall confine their remarks to the issues before the City Council.
- f. During City Council meetings, when there is more than one speaker on the same subject, City Council members will delay their comments until after all speakers on the subject have been heard.
- g. Council members shall clearly state when he/she has been directed by Council to speak on behalf of the City Council at the meeting of any board, committee, or commission. All other commentary offered before a board, committee or commission is deemed to be the personal opinion of the Council member.
- h. Council members shall not speak on behalf of the Council at any place or time unless they have been so directed by the body of the City Council. Any commentary offered at any time, in public or otherwise, is deemed to be the personal opinion of the City Council member speaking.



- i. Council members shall not speak to any board, committee or commission member on any matter that may come before the Council in a manner designed to influence the member.
- j. No Council member shall privately lobby any member outside of the meetings in an attempt to influence his or her individual vote.
- k. Any Council member who has testified on his or her own behalf or as a witness before a board, committee or commission on any administrative action which then comes to Council is disqualified from participating as a Council member on the matter *only if there is a legal conflict of interest*.

2. Confidentiality of Information Shared in Closed Session

- a. Council members should keep all matters discussed in closed session confidential.
- b. Any Council member who is found to have violated State Law with regards to the conduct of closed sessions shall be deemed to have violated the Codes.

3. <u>Individual Members of Council Providing Direction or Instruction to the City Manager or Staff</u>

- a. Only the City Council, acting as a body, is permitted to provide direction and instruction to the City Manager, City Secretary, City Attorney, or the City Judge (or Judges) regarding any matter confronting the City, whether policyrelated or otherwise.
- b. No member of Council (specifically including the Mayor, the Mayor Pro-Tem and the individual Council members) shall, at any time, give individual instruction to, attempt to define policy for, or make any demand of the City Manager, City Secretary, City Attorney, or the City Judge (or Judges) or any member of staff.
- c. No member of Council shall attempt to influence the City Manager, City Secretary, City Attorney, City Judge (or Judges) or any member of staff to circumvent City rules, policies, or ordinances.



- d. Any member of Council may, of course, at any time, make requests of the City Manager, City Secretary, City Attorney, or the City Judge (or Judges) or any member of staff for information, assistance, or other help as may be necessary, so long as no orders, threats, promises, intimidations, or ultimatums, explicit or implicit, are issued.
- e. The single exception to this rule is that in times of emergency lawfully declared by the Mayor, the Mayor may act independently as to matters of urgent need until a meeting of the Council, in quorum, can be called.
- f. Any member of Council giving individual instruction or making a demand of the City Manager, City Secretary, City Attorney, or the City Judge (or Judges) or any member of staff, with the exception of times of emergency lawfully declared by the Mayor, during which time the Mayor may act independently until a meeting of the Council, in quorum, can be called, shall be deemed to have violated the Codes.

4. City Council Media Communication Guidelines

- a. Effective media relations best serves the City by providing accountability to the public and transparency of government, ensuring accurate information is conveyed to the public, establishing and maintaining an accurate public perception of the City; informing residents of City programs and services, and promoting the City's achievements, activities, and significant events.
- b. Council Members and the Mayor have been elected to represent our community and are free to speak to the media on any subject. This policy and its included guidelines are intended to ensure that accurate consistent information is provided to the media and that City Council's integrity and professional image is preserved.

c. Guidelines:

- 1. Council Members and the Mayor have the right to express personal opinions on any issue, but must make it clear that they are speaking for themselves, are not speaking in an official capacity for the City, and are not speaking on behalf of City Council, unless the position has been adopted by the City Council;
- 2. All conversations with a member of the media should be treated as on the record.
- 3. Where time permits City Council members and the Mayor should communicate with the City's Public Information Officer prior to interviews with the media; otherwise, all interviews with a member of the media should be reported to the



City's Public Information Officer as soon as reasonably possible after the interview.

- 4. There are certain highly sensitive issues that may require greater discretion when speaking to media. These issues include:
 - i. Legal issues, including liability issues and pending litigation;
 - ii. Personnel issues, including those surrounding existing and former employees;
 - iii. Questions that involve police or fire investigations; or
 - iv. A community-wide situation or emergency.

It is highly encouraged that City Council members and the Mayor contact the City Manager for any relevant information prior to commenting on such matters.

Violations

- 1. <u>Violation of the Code of Ethics</u>
 - a. Council members are expected to abide by the Codes at all times.
 - b. Any Council member not adhering to the Codes shall be in violation of said Codes.
- 2. <u>Violations of Provisions of the City Charter</u>
 - a. Council members are expected to abide by the articles set forth in the City Charter.
 - b. Any Council member who acts in violation of or in a manner inconsistent with the provisions of the City Charter shall be deemed to have violated the Codes.



3. <u>Violations of Law or Policy by Council Members</u>

Depending on the circumstances of alleged violations of law or policy, the Council may initiate an investigation of the allegations prior to the filing of a request for any of the actions described in this policy.

Nothing in this policy shall preclude individual Council members from making public statements regarding such alleged conduct.

In deciding whether or not to open an investigation (whether pursuant to these rules or pursuant to Article IV, Section 4.10 of the City Charter), City Council should consider:

- a. whether a Council investigation may compromise other investigations regarding the same alleged actions, and, if the actions may result in criminal charges, whether the right of the accused Council member to a fair jury trial may be compromised by proceeding with an investigation;
- b. if persons involved in the allegations may choose to exercise their constitutional right against self-incrimination, which may limit the investigation's ability to present a full picture of alleged events; and
- c. how to ensure the protection of rights of those accused of violations of law or policy, those making such accusations, and those who have information regarding the accusations.

At any point during any of the processes described in this policy, the Council may refer the matter, as appropriate, to the Bexar, Comal or Guadalupe County District Attorney, the Texas Elections Commission, or to another law enforcement agency, for investigation. Following such a referral, the Council may proceed with any actions it chooses to take under the provisions of the City Charter.

Reporting Violations

Any suspected violation or alleged violation by a Council member must be reported to the Mayor. Any suspected violation or alleged violation by the Mayor shall be reported to the Mayor Pro-Tem and the City Attorney. In the case of a City staff member making the report regarding a Council member, the report shall be made to the City Manager, who will then report it to the Mayor. Upon report, the City Manager and City Attorney will assist the Mayor (or the Mayor Pro-Tem regarding a report concerning the Mayor) in following the procedures addressing violations or alleged violations.



Procedure for Conducting Inquiries

The role of leading an inquiry of any Council member for any violation or alleged violation of this policy lies with the Mayor, Mayor Pro-Tem, and, if approved by Council, an independent attorney or investigator. If the Mayor is the subject of an inquiry, the Mayor Pro-Tem, or the next ranking official by seniority and, if approved by Council, an independent attorney or investigator will lead the inquiry. The City Attorney shall not conduct the investigation of any Council member.

All Council members have a right to participate in the inquiry process regarding violations or alleged violations and their subsequent enforcement.

Any member of the Council who is the subject of an inquiry shall have the ability to provide a written statement responding to the findings of the inquiry.

Enforcement of Violations

The members of City Council have the obligation to govern themselves responsibly in the enforcement of any violation of this policy. The objective for establishing rules of enforcement pertaining to this policy is to provide fair, consistent, concise, and efficient guidelines for the use of enforcement against violations of this policy. As a general matter, enforcement of this policy may be progressive, but circumstances may indicate that strong actions be taken immediately. Furthermore, Council is not bound to the enforcement guidelines of this policy and should make decisions on a case-by-case basis. City Council, as a collective body, may change the order of the disciplinary steps listed below, or may choose not to use any step, depending on the circumstances under review.

City Council members may take any appropriate disciplinary action including, but not limited to:

Cautioning

- o Cautioning is identified as a verbal reprimand due to a violation of the policy. The cautioning is only a verbal reprimand and shall not be recorded.
- A cautioning shall only be administered in private by the Mayor with only one
 (1) member of Council present. If the Mayor is receiving the cautioning, it shall be administered in private by the Mayor Pro-Tem with only one (1) member of Council present.

Correction



- Correction is identified as a verbal reprimand due to multiple policy violations.
 The correction of any Council member, including the Mayor, will not be administered in writing, and shall be conducted in accordance with the Open Meetings Act.
- A quorum of Council plus one (1), including the corrected Council member, shall be present during the correction of another Council member.
- The City Attorney shall be notified of the correction before the correction is administered and the City Attorney shall be present during the administration of the correction.

Censure

- The act of placing a Council member under censure is an official and public reprimand of a City Council member by the body of the City Council for multiple and/or serious infractions against the City Council Code of Ethics. Therefore, City Council Members who are placed under censure are considered to be 'not in good standing' with the body of the Council.
- The censure of any Council member, including the Mayor, shall be administered in writing.
- Censure may last up to sixty (60) days or as appropriately defined by City Council on a case-by-case basis.
- o At the end of the censure period, the censure has expired and shall not be extended.
- A Council member placed under censure may return to a good standing status once their censure period has ended.
- o The body of the City Council may determine to end the censure period of a Council member prior to the conclusion of said period at their discretion.
- o All censure hearings shall be conducted in accordance with the Open Meetings Act.
- Because censures are administered in writing, a censure must be publicly voted on in open session of City Council. The censure of any Council member must be passed by a 2/3 supermajority vote.

BACKGROUND

Annexation of land into the City's corporate limits may be voluntary or involuntary. Each type has Texas Local Government Code (LGC) requirements that identify the necessary process based on the annexation type. The City's Unified Development Code (UDC) Section 21.4.8 includes provisions that apply to requests for voluntary annexation meeting certain criteria. This section of the City's UDC includes provisions for processing of voluntary annexation requests.

Schertz 312, LLC has submitted a petition for voluntary annexation to the City of Schertz for approximately 142 acres of land located generally 3,500 feet southwest of the intersection of Doerr Lane and Bell North Drive, Comal County, Texas.

The subject property is directly related to City of Schertz, Resolution 20-R-83 and City of San Antonio, Ordinance 2020-12-10-0903. These documents between the two cities agreed to a release of the subject property from the City of San Antonio's Extraterritorial Jurisdiction to the City of Schertz based on certain conditions to be met by the City of Schertz. One of those conditions was that the City of Schertz would start the annexation proceedings on the property within three months of the effective date of the ordinance. This resolution (Res. No. 21-R-03) is the initial step in the annexation proceedings on this property, which complies with the requirement based on the agreement between the City of Schertz and the City of San Antonio.

Upon City Council accepting Schertz 312, LLC's current petition for voluntary annexation of the approximately 142 acres, it would initiate the process to annex and zone the property. The adoption of this resolution accepting the petition for annexation from Schertz 312, LLC does not annex the subject property, but allows for City Council to annex the property by ordinance in the future. A subsequent ordinance for annexation must be approved by City Council to annex the property, tentatively scheduled to be heard at the January 26, 2021, City Council meeting. Schertz 312, LLC has also request to zone the subject property, upon annexation, Manufacturing District- Light (M-1).

A public hearing notice was published on December 16, 2020, in the San Antonio Express News.

GOAL

Schertz 312, LLC is requesting voluntary annexation into the City of Schertz because of their desire to be located within the Schertz City limits and their desire to develop the property in accordance with the requested Manufacturing District- Light (M-1) zoning district.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT

Promote the safe, orderly, efficient development and ensure compliance with the City's vision of future growth.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends approval of Resolution 21-R-03 accepting a petition for voluntary annexation.

FISCAL IMPACT

The approval of Resolution 21-R-03 accepting a petition for voluntary annexation does not have a financial impact on the City; however, the end annexation of the property will. In accordance with Texas Local Government Code (LGC) Chapter 43, the City must provide services to the land on the effective date of the annexation.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of Resolution 21-R-03 accepting a petition for voluntary annexation.







Subject: Ordinance No. 21-S-01 - Conduct a public hearing, consideration, and/or action

approving a request to rezone approximately 10.5 acres of land from Planned Development District (PDD) to Planned Development District (PDD), generally located southeast of the intersection between Hallie Chase and Hallie Loop, more specifically described as Hallie's Cove Subdivision Units 4A and 4B, City of Schertz, Bexar County, Texas. First Reading (B. James/L. Wood/N. Koplyay)

BACKGROUND

The original Hallie's Cove Planned Development District (PDD) zone change was approved by the Schertz City Council on September 27, 2016. An amendment to the Hallie's Cove PDD was approved by the Schertz City Council on January 24, 2017 in order to modify the minimum required lot depths and the method of measuring lot depths for irregular lots, which are defined as lots fronting cul-de-sacs, knuckled sacs, and curved streets.

This zoning application will be a further amendment to the Hallie's Cove PDD for Units 4A and 4B in order to amend the dimensional standards. The applicant is proposing this amendment to the Hallie's Cove PDD to ensure that Lots 8 and 11, Block 4 within Unit 4A and Lots 9 and 10, Block 4 within Unit 4B meet the zoning requirements necessary to subdivide the property. During the design phase of the Hallie's Cove Units 4A and 4B preliminary plats, a drainage easement (Lot 900, Block 4) was required to be widened by the City to accommodate the proposed development. This resulted in the adjacent single-family residential lots being shortened to 109 feet, which meant that the lots no longer satisfied the dimensional requirements per the PDD.

The applicant is proposing the following modifications to the PDD dimensional requirements to ensure that Lots 8-11, Block 4 can be subdivided in accordance with the subject property's zoning ordinance:

- The minimum depth for buildable single-family residential lots adjacent to drainage easements is proposed to be a minimum of 109 feet, instead of the currently required 119 feet, and
- The minimum area for lots adjacent to drainage easements is proposed to be a minimum of 8,720 square feet, instead of the currently required 9,600 square feet.

Please see the attached exhibit, entitled 'Dimensional Standards Comparison', that shows the existing dimensional requirements compared with the proposed dimensional requirements for reference. The proposed change to the dimensions of the buildable lots adjacent to drainage easements can be seen listed as superscript "c". This modification will only apply to Lots 8-11, Block 4, because the reduced requirements for lot depth and area are only applicable to buildable lots immediately adjacent to drainage easements.

The requested amendment to the Hallie's Cove PDD will be referred to herein as a rezoning since it requires the adoption of a new zoning ordinance.

Compatibility with Comprehensive Plan Goals and Objectives: The Comprehensive Plan, through the South Schertz Sector Plan, identifies the subject properties as Estate Neighborhood. The Estate

Neighborhood future land use designation is intended to address residential development patterns in Southern Schertz by requiring a minimum lot size of 0.5 acres. This leaves two potential options for redevelopment in the Estate Neighborhood designated areas: R-A zoning with mandated minimum 0.5 acres per lot, or the ENPDD zoning alternate development option that mandates an equivalent overall density to the R-A zoning district, while also allowing for residential clustering to preserve larger open spaces and reduce infrastructure costs. The overall density of the subdivision remains unchanged through the proposed rezone, and the character of the development standards remains consistent with the ENPDD alternate development option, approved as part of the original Hallie's Cove PDD. Therefore, the proposed rezone is compatible with the goals and objectives of the Comprehensive Plan.

Compatibility with Existing and Potential Adjacent Land Uses: The subject property is currently surrounded by agriculture/undeveloped land and single-family residential land. The proposed rezone to PDD is compatible with the existing and potential adjacent land uses.

Impact to Public Infrastructure and Facilities/Services: The proposed rezone should not have an adverse impact on public infrastructure or facilities/services.

Public Hearing Notices: In preparation for this public hearing, twenty-one (21) public hearing notices were mailed to surrounding property owners on November 25, 2020, and a public hearing notice was published in the *San Antonio Express* on December 16, 2020. At the time of this report staff has received two (2) responses: one in favor and one neutral to the proposed zone change.

Planning and Zoning Commission Recommendation: The Planning and Zoning Commission held a public hearing on December 9, 2020 and made a recommendation to City Council to approve the proposed zone change by a 7-0 vote.

GOAL

The goal of the proposed rezone is to amend the Hallie's Cove Units 4A & 4B PDD development standards to allow for a reduced minimum lot depth and minimum lot area for buildable single-family residential lots adjacent to drainage easements.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT

It is the City's desire to promote safe, orderly, efficient development and ensure compliance with the City's vision of future growth.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The applicant is proposing an amendment to the Hallie's Cove PDD development standards to reduce the minimum lot depth from 119 feet to 109 feet and the minimum lot area from 9,600 square feet to 8,720 square feet for buildable single-family residential lots adjacent to drainage easements. The modifications to the dimensional requirements will ensure that Lots 8-11, Block 4 can be subdivided in accordance with the subject property's zoning ordinance. The proposed rezone will not alter the character of the Hallie's Cove Subdivision, and will allow Units 4A and 4B to develop as originally intended with the previously approved Hallie's Cove PDD. Therefore, Staff recommends approval of the proposed rezone as submitted.

ORDINANCE NO. 21-S-01

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCHERTZ, TEXAS AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP BY REZONING APPROXIMATELY 10.5 ACRES OF LAND FROM PLANNED DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (PDD) TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (PDD), LOCATED SOUTHEAST OF THE INTERSECTION BETWEEN HALLIE CHASE AND HALLIE LOOP, MORE SPECIFICALLY DESCRIBED AS HALLIE S COVE SUBDIVISION UNITS 4A AND 4B, CITY OF SCHERTZ, BEXAR COUNTY, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, an application to rezone approximately 10.5 acres of land located southeast of the intersection between Hallie Chase and Hallie Loop, and more specifically described in Exhibit A and Exhibit B attached herein (herein, the "Property") has been filed with the City; and

WHEREAS, the City's Unified Development Code Section 21.5.4.D. provides for certain criteria to be considered by the Planning and Zoning Commission in making recommendations to City Council and by City Council in considering final action on a requested zone change (the "Criteria"); and

WHEREAS, on December 9, 2020, the Planning and Zoning Commission conducted a public hearing and, after considering the Criteria, made a recommendation to City Council to approve the requested rezoning according to the development standards set forth in Exhibit C attached herein (the "Development Standards"); and

WHEREAS, on January 5, 2021, the City Council conducted a public hearing and after considering the Criteria and recommendation by the Planning and Zoning Commission, determined that the requested zoning be approved as provided for herein.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCHERTZ, TEXAS: THAT:

- Section 1. The Property as shown and more particularly described in the attached Exhibit A and Exhibit B, is hereby zoned Planned Development District (PDD)
- Section 2. The Official Zoning Map of the City of Schertz, described and referred to in Article 2 of the Unified Development Code, shall be revised to reflect the above amendment.
- Section 3. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Ordinance for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the Council.
- Section 4. All ordinances and codes, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.

Section 6. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the City hereby declares that this Ordinance would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

Section 7. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Ordinance, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, as amended, Texas Government Code.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall be effective upon the date of final adoption hereof and any publication required by law.

Section 9. This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other ordinances of the City of Schertz, and this Ordinance shall not operate to repeal or affect any other ordinances of the City of Schertz except insofar as the provisions thereof might be inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, in which event such conflicting provisions, if any, are hereby repealed.





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I. General

Hallies Cove Unit 4 is a proposed 10.33 acre single family residential development in the City of Schertz, Bexar County, Texas. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCHERTZ TO SUPERSEDE ORDINANCE 20-H-15; EXTENDING A DECLARATION OF LOCAL DISASTER; RESTRICTING CERTAIN ACTIVITIES; ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS. PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; FIRST AND FINAL READING

WHEREAS, in December 2019 a novel coronavirus, now designated COVID-19, was detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China. Symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, cough, and shortness of breath. Outcomes have ranged from mild to severe illness, and in some cases death; and

WHEREAS, on January 20, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) Director General declared the outbreak of COVID-19 as a Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC), advising countries to prepare for the containment, detection, isolation and case management, contact tracing and prevention of onward spread of the disease; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, President Trump declared a state of emergency due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, President Trump has invoked the Stafford Act, which will allow state and local governments to access federal disaster relief funds; and

WHEREAS, Governor of Texas, issued a disaster proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying that COVID-19 poses an imminent threat of disaster for counties in the state of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Department of State Health Services has now determined that, as of March 19, 2020, COVID- 19 represents a public health disaster within the meaning of Chapter 81 of the Texas Health and Safety Code; and

WHEREAS, to date, there have been 48,693 confirmed positive cases in Texas; and

WHEREAS, the crisis that is now a pandemic has infected 4,805,430 people around the world resulting in 318,554 deaths, with 1,537,830 cases confirmed in the United States; and

WHEREAS, on March 31, 2020 Governor Abbott issued GA-14 superseding local authority invoked under Chapter 418 of the Government Code, and Chapter 81 and 122 of the Health and Safety Code where local order conflict with GA-14 or any previous order of the Governor related to the pandemic;

WHEREAS, also on April 17, 2020, Governor Abbott issued Executive Order GA-16 to replace Executive Order GA-14, and while Executive Order GA-16 generally continued through April 30, 2020, the same social-distancing restrictions and other obligations for Texans according to federal guidelines, it offered a safe, strategic first step to Open Texas, including permitting retail pick-up and delivery services; and

WHEREAS, Texas must continue to protect lives while restoring livelihoods, both of which can be achieved with the expert advice of medical professionals and business leaders and the continued gradual reopening of Texas pursuant to GA-18- GA-23 and subsequent orders of the Governor; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, the Mayor is designated as the Emergency Management Director of the City of Schertz, and may exercise the powers granted by the governor on an appropriate local scale; and

WHEREAS, Ralph Gutierrez, the Mayor of the City of Schertz previously determined and declared that extraordinary and immediate measures must be taken to respond quickly, prevent and alleviate the suffering of people exposed to and those infected with the virus, as well as those that could potentially be impacted by COVID-19;

WHEREAS, a declaration of local disaster and public health emergency includes the ability to reduce the possibility of exposure to disease, control the risk, promote health, compel persons to undergo additional health measures that prevent or control the spread of disease, including isolation, surveillance, quarantine, or placement of persons under public health observation, including the provision of temporary housing or emergency shelters for persons misplaced or evacuated and request assistance from the governor of state resources.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCHERTZ, TEXAS:

- Section 1. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Ordinance for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the City Council.
- Section 2. That the local state of disaster and public health emergency originally declared by Mayor Ralph Gutierrez for the City of Schertz, Texas, pursuant to §418.108(a) of the Texas Government Code and renewed and extended to May 26, 2020 at 11:59 p.m. by City Council Ordinance 20-H-15 pursuant to §418.108(b) of the Government Code, including all rules and regulations, is hereby further amended and extended until the Disaster Declaration put in place by Governor Abbott for the State of Texas expires.
- Section 3. Pursuant to §418.108(c) of the Government Code, this declaration of a local state of disaster and public health emergency shall be given prompt and general publicity and shall be filed promptly with the City Secretary.
- Section 4. Pursuant to §418.108(d) of the Government Code, this declaration of a local state of disaster and public health emergency activates the City of Schertz, Texas, emergency management plan.
- Section 5. All ordinances or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters herein except those portions deemed to conflict with any emergency orders of Governor Abbott.

- Section 6. This Ordinance shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.
- Section 7. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the City Council hereby declares that this Ordinance would have been enacted without such invalid provision.
- Section 8. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Ordinance, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended.
- Section 9. Should Governor Abbott lift the statewide disaster declaration and orders now in place prior to the date of expiration stated herein, this ordinance shall no longer be subject to enforcement by the City and shall be repealed by the City Council at the first legally posted meeting thereafter.
- Section 10. Any peace officer or other person with lawful authority is further authorized to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance or the orders of the Governor in accordance with the authority granted under the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, as applicable, which allows a fine not to exceed \$1000.00 and confinement not to exceed 180 days pursuant to Government Code 418.173.
- Section 11. This Ordinance shall be in force and effect from its first and final passage, and any publication required by law.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCHERTZ TEXAS THIS ORDINANCE WAS PASSED, ON FIRST AND FINAL READING, THE 23rd DAY OF JUNE 2020.
